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ABOUT YOKO

Yoko Kubrick, a Japanese American sculptor based in California, creates abstract sculptures influenced by nature's forms. She combines these shapes with tales from classical and comparative mythology, seeing the recurring stories across time and space as arising from the collective unconscious. Kubrick believes certain shapes appeal to humans because they stem from shared imagery, symbols, and motifs. Born on Guam and raised in various cultures, including her father's homeland of former Czechoslovakia, her childhood experiences sparked a fascination with mythology and sculptural traditions. As the first American-born member of her family, she embraces a cross-cultural perspective in her art. Yoko's choice of marble, natural stones, and bronze pays homage to the earth, as they are materials born from its depths.

Kubrick earned a B.A. in Environmental Studies from San Jose State University and an M.A. in Counseling Psychology and Art Therapy from Notre Dame de Namur University. She honed her artistic abilities through traditional atelier apprenticeships, learning bronze casting, fabrication, and marble carving. Her work, featured in respected publications and showcased in exhibitions, can be found in permanent installations in public spaces and private estates.
